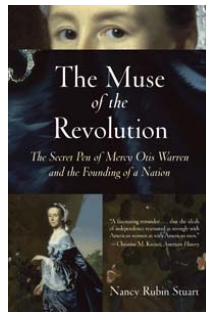

### THE MUSE of the REVOLUTION

The Secret Pen of Mercy Otis Warren and the Founding of a Nation

AUTHOR: NANCY RUBIN STUART

The heretofore seemingly obscured name of Mercy Otis Warren is illuminated in this thoroughly researched and revealing biographical account. When one thinks of the American Revolution, the names that generally come to mind are Washington, Franklin, Adams and Jefferson. This book will forever change these perceptions because it eloquently chronicles the life of this gifted woman who, through her literary acumen, became the voice as well as the conscience of one of the most important times in the history of this country.



Mercy Otis Warren, at a time when the education of women was usually extended to domestic chores only, was privileged to be formally schooled by her uncle, one of the most educated men in the county in which they lived. Her father allowed this to happen due mainly to her quest for knowledge as well as his disappointment in his younger son who refused to receive the scholarly preparation for entrance into Harvard. As a result, Mercy was introduced to Shakespeare, Milton, Pope and Dryden. From her uncle, who was also a pastor, she assimilated the rhythms and cadences he incorporated in his weekly sermons which permeated her writing later in life thereby setting the stage for the greatness that was to follow.

As the clouds of revolution began to encircle the colonists, Mercy rejected the restraints placed upon women to 'keep their place' and voiced her political beliefs. She trumpeted patriotic ideals of virtue, honor, integrity and the need to strive for relief from abuse. As a result, initially at the behest of James Adams, she wrote satirical plays and poems of the injustices the colonists incurred at the hand of the British. These revelations captivated the patriots and provoked a spirit for the need for independence that never ceased. She continually stoked the flames of the need for liberty and equality with her 'secret pen'.

One of the most renowned pieces that Mercy penned was *The History of the Rise, Progress and Termination of the American Revolution*. Although it was condemned by John Adams due to his dislike of his portrayal, it prevails as a most thorough eyewitness account of the American Revolution. This endeavor was exemplary not just for its content but for its creator who, through her strength and extraordinary genius, captured a glorious period in history that shall never be forgotten.

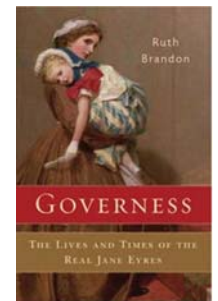
### GOVERNESS

The Lives and Times of the Real Jane Eyres

AUTHOR: RUTH BRANDON

Ruth Brandon, in a fascinating and fervent manner, reveals the hardships, desperation, loneliness and disillusionment that most of the women who were placed in the position of governess experienced in the nineteenth century. Many of them were from middle-class families who had neither a husband nor financial security and, therefore, no recourse but to turn to the only position available that would allow them to be sustained, albeit minimally. The treatment of these women was abominable and so effective was the brainwashing of women at the time (they were made to feel less than adequate and, basically, useless) that they were forced to submit to this fate.

However, there were some who did not 'stick to the script', so to speak. Mary Wollstonecraft became an advocate for women to receive an education equal to that of a man to enable them to become independent and productive in society. She authored *A Vindication of the Rights of Woman* which outlined how education would prepare a woman for her place as a citizen of the world. Unfortunately, she did not live long enough to see the fruits of her labors, but her dream was eventually realized. Others, like the Bronte sisters, established a place in history through their literary talents. And still another, Anna Leonowens, found her way to the Far East whereby her memoirs eventually inspired *The King and I*. These women, and many others, became forces in the world to eradicate the frustration and suppressed state governesses had been subjected to for so long and paved the way for them to reach a status of equality.



Initially, this book presented quite a challenge in terms of sustaining one's interest. However, the preconceived suspicion of impending boredom was soon erased by the quality and depth of the writing. The excitement that is associated with the words advocate, champion and protagonist soon replaced the tedium that was originally anticipated.

## It's Time Again To Dare To Dream

## Delectable Recipes

The following recipes are from Atsuko Asada's Japanese cooking class. These are both delicious and easy dishes that can be made quickly for a special meal. Enjoy!

### String Beans with Miso Sauce

1# fresh green beans; in large pot bring water to rapid boil, add pinch of coarse salt, add green beans, cook about 3 minutes. When green beans have cooked, run them under cold water, arrange on plate and pour sauce over them. Place lemon zest on top.

Sauce

2 T (heaping) White Miso (Bean Paste)

1 T Brown Sugar

1 T Sesame Seeds

2 T Sake or white wine

Mix all together; if too thick, thin with water or sake. If too salty, add a little lemon.

### Tilapia

Filets of Tilapia or any white fish

Olive oil to coat fish

Foil pieces for each fish filet

Layer individually in each piece of tinfoil:

A single Fish filet

Touch of salt and pepper

Chopped baby portabella mushrooms

Scallions sliced lengthwise

½ tsp capers

Drizzle of soy sauce

Small pat of butter

Drizzle of sake or white wine

Wrap foil around all – loosely; seal ends and edges. Place on cookie sheet and place in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serve the fish in the packet along with rice and the miso green beans.
